


#### **PROGRESS**


Here you find a representation—by the students' choice—of the cream of Anderson College personalities. This year the Council has had one of its ablest presidents in C. K. Byrd.

The seventh year of student rule at Anderson College will be, beyond a doubt, chalked as—peaceful; successful.












At the conclusion of the debate season, plans were made for the squads to appear before various service clubs and civic groups in Anderson, also to speak over radio station WHBU.





In addition, the quartette also broadcasts over WHBU daily throughout the college year. This program has been in charge of Mr. Cecil Byrd during 1936-1937.





#### ANDERSON COLLEGE ATHLETICS

Once again it may be said, "This year's athletic program has been the best in college history." This is especially true of intramural sports at Anderson College, and it is expected that by building upon a strong program of intramurals, in which all students participate, A. C. T. S. will some day hold strong prestige in Indiana and middle-western intercollegiate athletic competition.

Nineteen thirty-six and seven has brought to completion at Anderson one of the finest physical education plants in the state. The acquiring of this gymnasium has gone a long way in bringing about success in athletic endeavor.

Mr. Edgar May, physical education director and coach, is to be credited for a well-rounded physical program. Mr. May has arranged his departments in four divisions. The required division is composed of all students taking a full course. In it, fundamentals and rules are stressed. In varsity athletics, Anderson College has for many years been a strong contender in local conference basketball. Track and tennis are other sports falling within this division. Intramurals are based on fall, winter, and spring sports, and include all competitive sports within the college. With the assistance of the college nurse, the physical education department has developed a course of corrective physical education in which opportunity is offered to many students for correcting certain body irregularities.





#### **BASKETBALL SQUAD**








In the men's doubles, Ralph Gray and Fred Pinyoun shut out Louis Frost and Everett May 6-3, 6-0, for the doubles honors.


























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

## ANDERSON UNIVERSITY

In metropolitan Anderson, a city which some twenty years ago was a striving industrial center of only forty thousand people, we find one of the largest and most influential educational centers in Indiana. Seventy-five thousand people share in the culture and beauty that is Anderson's; that culture is due to no other force more than to Anderson University.

Twenty years have seen the institution grow from a small but respected college of some three hundred students to its present enrollment of five thousand. Its campus has expanded from the size of a city block or two to encompass five hundred acres of choice east side Anderson, much of the land, and several of the magnificent buildings being gifts of alumni of the university.

A very conspicuous structure on the campus is the library, Warner Hall, which houses one of the most complete university libraries in central United States. This building and several thousand of its volumes were the gift of Senator Paul Froelich in 1949.

The administration building, a beautiful edifice of Georgia marble, made possible through liberal donations from Dr. Streeter Stuart and Dr. David Gaulke, is a tribute to Dr. Morrison, President of the institution. The building is five floors high, and its fifty beautifully furnished offices provide space for the faculty and department heads. The university and administration offices cover the entire first floor.

Other important buildings on the campus are the beautiful music and science hall erected in 1955, as well as the huge gymnasium and field house, just completed in 1957. Those who enter Anderson are assured of adequate facilities for their personal development and education. Anyone inspecting the campus and buildings today will find much to excite pleasure and little to cause dissatisfaction.

#### ANDERSON UNIVERSITY HEAVILY ENDOWED

It is said that Anderson University is one of this state's richest institutions of higher learning. Since 1954, when three of the most widely known members of the class of 1937 endowed the school for four million dollars, not one student has paid any tuition. Yet, the requirements for entrance to the university are extremely rigid, not only in a scholastic sense, but high morals and good character are primary requisites of all applicants for matriculation. The university has from its beginning been under the direct supervision of the Church of God.



# ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF ANDERSON UNIVERSITY

For a number of years Anderson University has been regulating student life by a very efficient system of government known as the "Associated Students." Within this large group are the Men's Council and the Women's Council which deal with problems of conduct concerning the student body. Penalties given by the council are impersonal and are fixed according to the offense, not according to arbitrary opinion. There are weekly meetings of this association which are of an executive rather than a judiciary nature. The Dean of Men and Dean of Women act in an advisory capacity only. Usually matters pertaining to social life cause little trouble, as there are definite evenings for activity, which all observe. Men and women students are permitted social engagements without asking special permission and without being restricted by specific time limits. Both the administration and students feel that the system is fair as well as effective.



## **RAVENS FLY HIGH**

Anderson, Feb. 2, 1957.—After a hard and fast tilt with Purdue last night at Lafayette, the Anderson University Ravens flashed through tonight on their home floor at Byrd Fieldhouse to upset Indiana University to a count of 47 to 12.

It is an interesting coincidence that in the final game of the first season in the fieldhouse given by his father, who was prominent in early basketball here, young Cece Byrd, Jr., led his teammates by scoring 30 of the 47 points. This gives Byrd a larger margin over Jack Frost, son of Louis Frost, of Anderson University fame, for season high score honors of the state.
