

Rev. I. K. Dawson to Join College Forces

Considering her short history Anderson College and Theological Seminary has a large group of enthusiastic Alumni. These hundreds of people who have graduated from Anderson College know something of the problems which always confront their Alma Mater. Naturally, they are eager to see her make proper and normal advancement. During the past four years, under the leadership of their president, George A. Edes, and their Executive Committee, consisting of Ida Byrd Rowe, Thelma Clark, John H. Kane and William A. Fleenor, they have contributed very materially to the support of Anderson College.

But there is a strong feeling on the part of the college administration and the alumni officials to the effect that only a small percentage of the potential strength of Anderson Alumni has been exerted.

A movement has been launched, therefore, by joint action of the college administration and the executive committee of the Alumni Association whereby a full-time executive-secretary will do promotional work among Alumni. In casting about for a suitable person to take over this important task, we have turned to Rev. I. K. Dawson, pastor at Bloomington, Ill. Brother Dawson graduated from Anderson College in 1928. Since that time he has been actively engaged in pastoral work in the states of Indiana, Kansas, and Illinois. In this work he has been very successful, and has shown unusual organizational ability. His most recent pastorate at Bloomington, Ill., has demonstrated even more than ever before his unusual ability. We all feel fortunate in being able to secure the services of Brother Dawson. He has resigned as pastor at Bloomington, and Rev. Charles O. Lee has been accepted as the new pastor there. Brother Dawson, together with his family, will



move to Anderson so as to be able to enter on the new work at the beginning





New Fire Escape on North Side of Main Building—A Lifesaver


