

The congregation appreciated Melvin Miller's solo, "I Trust in God." Then John Kane acknowledged the gifts, mentioning each state and asking the representatives of it to stand while he read the amount of the gifts and the churches from which they were received.

George Blackwell, in behalf of the Alumni Association, presented the gifts to President Morrison for the College. The total amounted to \$6,000, with many congregations as yet unheard from, but having specified their intention of sending in their contributions.

President Morrison is never an indifferent speaker, but he spoke with more than the usual feeling on this occasion. He mentioned the growing need for more space, with the student body growing very fast, and the situation becoming more critical each year with regard to new dormitories, a science hall, and a library building. He felt that it is

shocking that in some instances Alumni pastors did not send in contributions from their churches. Dr. Morrison said, in part: "We are trying to make the college a place primarily to serve the Church—a college which stands for real religion, which will be a proper place for these young people who come here. We want to serve and to have the support of the Church. We have a tremendous job to do."

Dean Olt offered the prayer of dedication of the gifts, asking with fervor that they might be used to the glory of God.

The trio, composed of Bernice McCurdy, Martha Phelps, and Gertie Miller, sang, "Thanks Be to God," after which Rev. Kane introduced the speaker, Rev. C. L. Quinn, of Lima, Ohio, who spoke on the subject, "Give God the Best," using as a text David's vow, "Neither will I offer unto the Lord that which costs me nothing."

"It is not important that we give gifts which do not cost us anything," said Mr. Quinn. "As a nation, we spend five or six billions of dollars annually for alcohol, while all the gifts for religious purposes amount to scarcely one billion dollars. To the god of war, we give tens of billions of dollars. We are bringing now the flower of humanity as a sacrifice on the altar of war. To God we offer only that which we do not need: We can never have a better world until we give God our best.

"It does not matter whether you are going to be a schoolteacher, a housewife, a doctor, a minister, or a lawyer," the speaker continued. "That is not the important thing. The thing that is important is that, in your field of activity and labor, you give God the best you have—the best of your time, the best of your talents."

Rev. Quinn spoke further of the value of higher education at this time, especially for those who will do rehabilitation work requiring foreign languages and knowledge of how to carry on relations with the peoples of other countries. Effective work requires higher education as well as that deeper spiritual experience essential to all work in God's kingdom.

The service closed with a benediction by Rev. I. K. Dawson, former Executive Secretary of the National Alumni Association.

What Is Our Executive Secretary Doing?

I shall be glad to tell you. I worked on the September *News* mostly by remote control from Detroit, Michigan. I arrived at the Alumni office about the middle of September. The first thing on the docket was the October *Alumni News*. You should know that we are mailing approximately 6,500 *News* each month. It is a big job to keep our address stencils correct as there is a lot of moving going on. We send the *News* to all the Servicemen who have attended college here.

Daily there is much letter writing. Because a letter is mimeographed is no sign that it lacks the personal touch with us. I have looked at the addressed envelopes and felt and knew that I was writing to each one of you personally. Our Alumni family is large, and it takes thousands of letters to try to serve each one of you. Keep your letters coming our way. We not only like to get them, but we must have them in order to know how we can serve you best. And then we need news—lots of it—so as to keep an eight-page paper coming to you every month.

I have been very busy promoting College Sunday.

I have attended the following meetings: Indiana State Ministers' Meeting, Michigan State Ministers' Meeting, Indianapolis Pastors' Fellowship, Southeastern Ministers' Meeting at Jacksonville, Florida, and the West Virginia Ministers' Meeting. I was the speaker at the Northern Indiana District Youth Rally at South Bend and at the Northern Indiana Youth Convention at Marion.

I have preached about twenty-four times at the following places: Rochester, Indiana; Dayton, Ohio (two Sundays and two radio programs); two congregations in Detroit, Michigan (on two different trips); two different congregations in Indianapolis (on two trips); Harold Boyer's church in St. Louis, Missouri; twice at the Kansas City Assembly; four different Church of God congregations in Anderson, Sturgis (Michigan) Ministerial Association's Union Thanksgiving service, which was held at the First Baptist Church. O. C. Denniston was the chairman.

I aim to serve my brother pastors all I can. Call on me for the things you feel I can do to help you. I am at your service.


