
Freshmen

Probably the greatest honor received by the team this year was the invitation to compete in the National Tournament at Kansas City.

Captained this year by Jack Van Dyke and Roy Davis, the squad played together better than ever before.

After taking second place in the state scoring honors in 1938, Van Dyke came through and finished on top this year with 252 points. Young placed third with 215 points.



Coach May may well be proud of his team, for he spent long and weary hours working for it and with it. The success of the team is indicative of those hours.





Raven Letter Men

And don't forget those ten men, and the dear old coach. They work hard on that floor, and do they ever eat!














Men

A Cappella

Alumni Association


