

# College to Offer Summer School Courses This Year

The first of this year the United States Office of Education asked all colleges in the country to accelerate their schedules so that a student could complete his college education in three years instead of four. Early in January at the Baltimore Conference, which was attended by representatives of most of the educational institutions of the country, stress was laid upon the fact that such acceleration should not be done at the expense of scholarship or by lessening graduation standards.

Anderson College, of course, fell in line with the recommendation. The easiest and most logical plan of three which were considered was that of adding a full summer program which would enable a student to do a semester of work in fifteen weeks in the summer. This will mean that if the freshman will add on a semester at the close of his freshman year in the summer, and put in another full summer at the end of his second academic year; then he will be able to graduate in June of his third year in school. Actually this means that one can complete a four-year course in two and three-fourths calendar years. A survey was recently made among the students now enrolled in the College to determine how many would like to take advantage of attending summer school this summer. It might be said here that here is a possibility, although not a certainty, that the Government may aid in financing students attending summer school, or perhaps aid the institutions which cooperate in the acceleration program. The government has made no definite announcement at the present time,

however. Sixty-three students who are now in school have already indicated their interest in attending summer school.

The dates for the summer school schedule have been arranged as follows:

First Term: June 15—July 18 (5 weeks, 6 days a week, 6 hours credit)

Second Term: July 20—August 22 (5 weeks, 6 days a week, 6 hours credit)

Intersession Term: August 24—September 11 (3 weeks, 6 days a week, 3 hours credit)

It is impossible to announce at this writing what subjects will be given, but there is every indication that among those offered will be history, English, Bible, psychology, education, and music.

## The Local Alumni Club of Anderson

Since there are a large number of former students of Anderson College living in the city of Anderson, a special local Alumni club has been organized and is thriving well under the leadership of the president, Loren Owen.

The group met at the College on Friday evening, January 30, to have dinner together. More than seventy members attended. W. Dale Oldham, president of the National Alumni Association, was present. He gave an encouraging message to the members of the local organization concerning the great possibilities of the alumni work.

A business session was held in the new college conference and dining room after the dinner. Projects for the local club were discussed and committees appointed to report on some activities which this local group might

undertake on behalf of the School. I. K. Dawson, our national executive-secretary, presented the plans for the Silver Anniversary drive.

The Club plans to meet the last week of January, March, May, September, and November of each year. Other officers of the group are Harold L. Phillips, vice-president, and Mrs. Dennis Larabee, secretary-treasurer.
