

PROSPECTIVE MINISTERIAL STUDENTS IN HIGH SCHOOL GIVEN PROTECTION BY SELECTIVE SERVICE

One of the problems which Anderson College has faced along with other theological training institutions has been that of insuring the entrance into theological seminaries of sincere young men still in high school. Many of these young men became eighteen before high-school graduation, and under the regulations of Selective Service System which have been in effect such students were promptly inducted into the armed forces upon their graduation.

We are all very happy that National Selective Service headquarters has seen fit to change this regulation to provide under certain circumstances, that highschool students, whose sincerity in entering the ministry is well established and substantiated, are to be entitled to the IV-D classification upon registration at their eighteenth birthday even though they have not entered theological seminary.

The regulations simply provide that such students must apply for entrance to an approved theological seminary while yet in high school and before they are eighteen years of age. The theological seminary, after investigation, may accept any such student on condition that the student thereafter is in continuous attendance at school twelve months each year under the accelerated program, and, provided further that his course of study is prescribed by the theological seminary.

It is a matter of urgency for the future welfare of the church that all pastors should inform prospective ministers in their congregations of the provisions of this regulation with the suggestion that such high-school students make application immediately to Anderson College and Theological Seminary.

Repairs Made on College Buildings

Anderson College buildings have undergone a decided change this summer. Should one walk into all the buildings he would find that nearly every one of them has been changed in some way. Even the gymnasium has had some extra rooms made on the outside, which will be used for office space. If you were here for Camp Meeting, you probably saw the remodeled stage in the gym.

Following graduation came a six months' loyalty to the Army as a civilian employee, but those loyalties were permanently transferred when she became Yeoman Hunnex of the United States Navy.

Her experience and education ideally suit her for the worth-while job she is doing, as well as offering proof of the kind of service well-trained Waves are rendering here at home.

Religious Life at A.C.T.S. in '44-'45

This is written in faith-for at the time I am writing the college year has not yet begun, but I think I have some firm bases for my faith.

One basis is the record and experiences of twenty-seven years of history at A.C.T.S., first as Anderson Bible Training School, then as Anderson Bible School and Seminary, and then as Anderson College and Theological Seminary. The curriculum has changed much, faculty changes have come, and a few thousand students have come and gone, but the predominant emphasisthat of a thoroughgoing religious lifehas not changed. As an alumnus and faculty member I think I can assure you that the Administration and Faculty and student body this year will carry on this religious tradition of your School.

Another ground of my faith is that I think we see more clearly each year that religion is a matter of all of life, just as we are seeing that education is for all of life. Even as we more clearly see that learning arises out of life, so religion, or man's relationship to his God, arises out of the experiences of daily life. Here we do not only teach religion and have the forms of religion, but we strive by the help of God to experience God, and the experiencing of God is in daily life. We try to take all the experiences of life and lift them up into the presence of God so that whether we eat or drink, work or play, laugh or weep, study or pray, all is religious.

I am writing in faith that the provisions for encouraging the religious life this year will not be fewer or less, but more and greater than in previous years.

The church services which the faculty and students will attend at the various congregations throughout the city and elsewhere, the Sunday-school

classes organized for them, the chapel services three times weekly, the noonday prayer meetings on days when chapel services are not held, the various group prayer meetings, the clubsall of which are religious, occasional times of spiritual refreshing during a class session, more opportunities for personal counseling-all of these and more will make for reality in our religious life. These things are not merely tolerated or permitted, but they are positively promoted in their functioning by the Committee on Religious Life as well as by the Administration and student group in a general way.

I am writing this in faith because this year of all years is a critical year. We face a crisis in world history and we want to see Christianity function in this crisis, and as a Christian college we want to see not only our personal problems but the problems of the world, and be workers together with God in helping to solve those problems.

I am writing this in faith-faith that looks forward to the time in the very near future when many of our boys now in the Armed Forces around the world and in Civilian Service Camps will be back in these halls and on this campus with us again. We shall this year do our best to give God a larger place in our life here so that these boys may find when they come back to us a place where God is real, and so that in a small way at least we may serve them.

I am writing this by faith-for this vear as formerly we shall have a faculty that are Christian, and a student body that is predominantly so. We shall likely have fifty to sixty ordained preachers in attendance. This ought to help the spiritual tone measurably.

I am writing in faith-in faith that all who read this will pray with us and for us and work with us to make this college year one that will be rich in religious living.

"In Indiana there are some twenty-seven nontax supported schools of higher learning, most of which are church-related institutions. Of this group, Anderson is the youngest. In enrollment this year Anderson is number five, Butler, Notre Dame, DePauw, Evansville having larger enrollments than Anderson."

Editorial

"Harvest hands" are scarce. They are urgently needed. This great lack is tragic. Jesus faced the problem of the shortage of harvest hands. "The laborers are few." He did something about it. Up and down the highways of Palestine he called for fishers of men and he got some good ones. A call from Jesus was a challenge in those days; it is no less a challenge today.

"Laborers are few" would command no serious attention if jobs were few. But when important work goes begging, then the scarcity of workers is a tragic thing. For how long will the spiritual harvest (or any harvest) wait on harvest hands? No course in agriculture is needed to find the answer.

Jesus was deeply moved as he faced a bumper crop, a "plenteous harvest," and he knew that most of it would perish for the want of harvest hands. He feels that his disciples should be deeply moved, too; but are we?

The work of gathering in the present spiritual harvest cannot be put off. To cast it into the lap of the next generation solves nothing and frees none of us from our responsibility. The fact that there will be a later harvest is not a legitimate excuse for neglecting the present harvest.

Jesus makes it clear that all of his disciples, knowing as they do the harvest facts, can and should pray the Lord of the harvest to challenge and engage more harvest hands. This is our clear duty and should be our glad duty: prayer and work for more and more workers for God's kingdom. Right here is where Anderson College comes into the picture. The College must challenge the youth of the Church to fulltime service as harvest hands.

The Alumni Association considers the business of enlisting the Church's youth for kingdom building as one of its feature jobs. Alumni, give yourselves to this work. You cannot invest your time more profitably.

The College must help these young people find their places in the harvest field. Some young people coming to Anderson College know not what God wants them to do, but with a college like ours, constantly picturing to its students the big harvest and the few harvest hands, soon the call comes and the work is made clear.

Adult friends of Anderson College, you, too, have a part. You are to supply Anderson College with greater and more adequate buildings so the Church will be served by highly skilled workers. JOHN H. KANE

BETTY JO SCHWEIGER and JACK HUTCHINSON had a lovely wedding on September 25 at the home of Judge Harold Achor, in Anderson.


