Of Tradition



Anderson College was built upon the ideals of an inimitable religious family that laid the cornerstone with great hopes for the future of their faith, but little dreaming that what they started would one day be an accredited college of Indiana. Progress crowned their efforts from the start. The Gospel Trumpet Workers' Home was developed into a bible school when the need arose for trained religious workers. The Bible School was soon found to be inadequate and the Theological Seminary was incorporated. A college of liberal arts was added to the progressive institution in 1928. 



Anderson College has always been proud of her musical achievements, but this year has marked the beginning of a new era in that tradition. Under the leadership of Miss Jackson, who has so recently joined the teaching staff, the A Cappella Choir in its initial year has enjoyed an unforetold success.

The public was thrilled for the first time by this infant organization, when it presented at the Park Place Church the dramatic Christmas production *The Light of the Ages*. This will remain long in the minds of those who were fortunate enough to attend the event as an outstanding appearance for the A Cappella Choir.

Palm Sunday witnessed the second major performance, when the Choir presented a miscellaneous program of Passion Week and Easter music at the Park Place Church. Many of the audience were moved to tears by the religious fervor of the compositions, and were carried away into heavenly ecstasy as the program was concluded with the mighty *The Heavens Are Telling* from Joseph Haydn's *The Creation*.

The A Cappella Choir pledges itself to devote its entire efforts to produce the best in vocal music. It recognizes its art to be "that art which is nearest expression of the inexpressible, which, so much a thing of the spirit, escapes all confines of the visible, corporal, or static." Singing for the most part unaccompanied, the choir presents, through the medium of the human voice, the deepest stirrings of the souls of such creative artists as Haydn, Bortniansky, Burleigh, Cain, Christiansen, and many others.

As a regularly scheduled class, the group meets three times a week in study and rehearsal.

It may safely be predicted that we shall hear much of the A Cappella Choir in the future.



Publications Board

Being a Christian Institution, Anderson College is eager that its publications be an asset to the College—publications of which it can be proud. It is for this reason that a group is chosen to guide the journalistic activities of the school. The Board consists of members chosen from the student body at large, and several faculty members. The Board meets twice a year to nominate candidates for editor and business manager of the *Echoes* and the *Orange and Black*, and to determine the general policies of the college publications. The Board also ratifies all associate members on the staffs of the two publications, and cares for any emergency that may arise. Through the leadership of the Publications Board, Anderson College's journalistic endeavors have progressed remarkably. It is a goal to have a printed *Orange and Black* next year of which the students can rightly be proud.

Ministerial Committee

For a long time the ministerial students of Anderson College felt a need for a ministerial deputation and coordinating body. As a result, the *Student Ministerial Committee* was organized under the auspices of the *Religious Life Committee* in October, 1937.

The *Committee* meets every Saturday evening in the Directors' Room of the Gospel Trumpet Company where discussions, led by the most able men of the Church, are held. In this way, young ministers and ministers-to-be benefit from a consideration of problems and tactics peculiar to the ministry. In addition, deputations are appointed and coordination of effort is achieved. Teams are formed and sent out to churches within easy driving distance, and practical, directed experience is obtained by the students. The work of the *Committee* is rapidly becoming an essential part of ministerial training in Anderson College.

Social Committee

For years the *Social Committee*, under the direct supervision of the Dean of Women, has directed the social activities of Anderson College. Activities are planned for every Friday night and for most Saturday nights far in advance. A reception for the freshmen opened the social season of the year. Later, several hikes were planned with refreshments, and a camp fire or two held on the campus. Few social activities were held during basketball season, for obvious reasons. Over the holidays, special committees functioned, and some very interesting times were arranged. The only claim the Social Committee can have on the skating parties and on the two "big" parties of the year is that it gave its approval and arranged for open dates.

Due to the reorganization of the Student Council, a temporary committee served the first part of the year; later, a regular committee was chosen by the Council.

Booster Club

In general, it is the purpose of the Booster Club to fill all worthy needs in connection with student life at Anderson College. To avoid becoming an unwieldy organization, the Club has limited its membership to twenty-five men, and only those who have proved themselves to have an ambitious spirit of cooperation are eligible for membership.

During the last school year the Club has engaged in two major projects that have directly benefited every student in the school. Through the cooperation of several individuals and institutions, a program of personal hygiene education was begun. It is planned that in future years this course will be offered to all who are interested. As one feature of the course, the student body was offered the Wasserman test free of charge, and a commendable spirit of student cooperation was in evidence.

The second major project was a campaign to furnish the chapel with new songbooks. One hundred *Hymns and Spiritual Songs* were purchased with the hope that more may be added in the future, if needed.

Several activities of lesser importance that were on the Booster calendar included selling and taking tickets at all basketball games. Profits from candy sales, of which the Boosters have the concession, were diverted into athletic channels. With these funds, new jerseys were purchased for the varsity basketball team, a new tennis net and new archery equipment were obtained.

When the College sponsored the first Annual Inter-City Basketball Tournament, the Boosters acted as hosts. The Club also conceived and promoted a Boost-the-School-Day, during which an appeal was made, and facilities were provided for students to mail a personal testimony to a friend not in school. In these and other ways, the Booster Club sought to manifest its cardinal purpose—*service*.

As they look forward to next year, the Boosters anxiously anticipate presenting an electric organ for Chapel.

Sachem Club

The *Sachem Club* is the youngest of the three service clubs of Anderson College, but it is not far behind in its aggressive program. The club was organized in 1937 by a group of men who felt that a need existed for an active progressive club whose interests would be outside athletics. In order to satisfy this need, they drew up a constitution. As a result the *Sachem Club* was founded. The name, Sachem, was adopted on the suggestion of Professor Gaulke. It is derived from an old Indian word which means "leader."

Once organized, the *Club* immediately whipped itself into action, and within two months had purchased a badly needed electric scoreboard for the new gymnasium. The Club has sponsored plays, pie socials, entertainments, and sold advertisements to raise funds to pay for this and other projects.

President Morrison addressed the *Sachems* at their first meeting and expressed the opinion that the club was of such caliber as was necessary to accomplish great things for the college. Due to excellent leadership, time has shown that he was not wrong. But even though they will lose their active and aggressive president, Fred Bruner, the *Sachems* are not willing to rest on their already won laurels and are looking forward to even greater service next year.

In addition to the service program, the Club engages in an extensive athletic schedule in softball, basketball, and volley ball, mainly with the *Booster Club*. A healthy spirit of rivalry exists between the two clubs which has done much to increase college interest in intra-mural athletics.

Student Council

The *Student Council* assumed an entirely new form and function this year. Prior to this time it served as a student governing agent. That work has been taken over and administered by the Men's and Women's Councils of their respective organizations. The purpose now is to stimulate, supervise, coordinate, and initiate if necessary, any or all student activities, committees, and organizations.

It is composed of the presidents of the four classes, and the officers of the Men's and Women's Councils. The work of the *Council* is administered by special committees who report their activities and progress at every regular meeting, at which time, too, suggestions are made and policies determined.

Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society

This *Society* is the College chapter of the *National Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society*. It was organized in 1937 to fill a long-felt need for a college unit of the national society. It has as its purpose the promotion of missionary interests at home and abroad through education, and programs and speakers are sponsored to this end. Besides the public activities, each member must make this personal pledge: "God being my helper, I promise to pray for and support missions."

The "A" Club



Debate

Excellence in debating has been traditional at Anderson College ever since it entered inter-collegiate contests. This year was not an exception despite the fact that there were but two Letter Men among the eight debaters, and that the teams were changed several times during the season. The record for the season in the *Indiana Debate Conference* was as follows:

In addition to these debates there were victorious encounters with DePaul, Missouri State Teachers College, and twelve wins for both A and B teams at the Manchester Invitational Tournament. The season, as always, included numerous practice tilts with many of the near-by colleges. This makes in all one of the most intensive as well as extensive seasons in which Anderson College has ever engaged.

Anderson College's debaters do not limit their forensic encounters to inter-collegiate debates, as a number usually participate in the *State Peace Oratorical Contest*. Anderson gained a rare distinction this year in Mr. Arthur Hoffman who placed among the winners in a highly skilled and hotly contested field of college orators.

A minor purpose of the Club is to promote interesting projects. This year the Club ushered at all home games, elected their leaders, coined yells, aided in the making of programs, sold mascots, and did much of the planning for the Basketball Banquet. It has been customary for the Club to donate each year to the *Echoes Staff* a small sum of money. We are glad that we were able to follow tradition this year.

Professor Clausen's Chorus, as it is popularly known, is the oldest organization of Anderson College, and has for years supplied an outlet in choral singing for musically talented students. Its membership usually numbers well over thirty and it meets in rehearsal three times a week.





Basketball







Much of the team's success of the past season may well be attributed to the ceaseless and masterly efforts of our physical education director and coach—Edgar May. On him lay the responsibility of whipping into shape a group of comparatively green players; to experiment and reexperiment to produce for Anderson College the winning combination that we enjoyed during the past year. Hours of planning, nights of worry, and "pains in the neck"—these constituted the life of our coach while he worked to prepare a smooth playing team. But Mr. May assures us that the sweet victories that the Ravens gained were more than sufficient compensation. Remember that slow beaming smile after each conquest?

No small measure of the team's success was due to the timely and helpful suggestions concerning plays, foot-work, and ball-handling given by Mr. Robert Kessler, recently All-American at Purdue University. Kessler willingly devoted several evenings a week to working with the boys and Coach May, and deserves credit with Mr. May for the team's successes this season.

A thankless job is that of student basketball manager, for it consists of all work and little play. Our congratulations to Mr. Westlake and Mr. McElroy, both of whom worked diligently at their posts in keeping the equipment in shape and available.

Résumé

On twenty-one occasions, the scream of the referee's whistle called the Anderson Ravens into another "basket shooting contest." In eleven of these engagements, the sharp report of the pistol ending the conflict found the Ravens on top. Six of these eleven victories were registered on the local hardwood court, while six of the ten decisions dropped were on foreign floors. This represents a win percentage of .523 as compared with last year's percentage of .308. If this be evidence of a possible yearly trend, we may look in the near future for the Anderson College basketball standings well up in the top divisions. Of the ten losses sustained, two might easily have been victories as they were dropped by a very narrow margin; one, by two points and the other, by but a single point.

Colleges and universities defeated by the Anderson Ravens this year were N.A.G.U. Normal, Giffin, Taylor, Rose Polytechnic, Huntington, and Oakland City. Only Oakland City College was able to defeat our team on a return engagement on their home floor.


Manchester, Central Normal, Franklin, St. Joseph, Hanover, Oakland City, and our arch-rival Indiana Central, were the teams to defeat the Ravens.

The team played very consistently throughout the season with a slight spurt during the latter half of the schedule. This is clearly evidenced by the fact that the boys won their first, third, seventh, ninth, tenth, eleventh, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, eighteenth, and twentieth games. This speaks well for their constant interest and proper training throughout the season.

Even though they were not at the top of the ladder, the Anderson College team gained a rare distinction this year as being one of the few teams in the state to have a "point-a-minute" record. Anderson's point average per minute was 1.035. In Jack Van Dyke, the Ravens had the runner-up for individual scoring honors in a state known for its fine basketball players. He also was chosen on the All-State team as forward.

Though the loss of Captain Louis Frost, who has played his fourth year of intercollegiate basketball, will be sorely felt, we do not believe it to be too optimistic to predict that next year will be an even more successful season than this year in intercollegiate basketball at Anderson College.






Sharpshooters

An innovation in athletics at Anderson College this year was the art of sharpshooting. It mattered not whether your hero was William Tell and you wanted to follow in his steps with bow and arrow poised, or you were a "modern" and preferred an implement which ejects its missile much more swiftly and accurately—namely, the small-bore rifle—you would be satisfied, for both were in vogue.

Both archery and rifle ranges were constructed east of the gymnasium proper. Distance markers, furnished with arrow holders were placed along the range.

Almost any time of the day one could hear the sharp crack of the rifle or the twang of a bow-string if he chanced near the ranges, for the A.C. sharpshooters were ardent followers of their sport. Although the boys were in the majority, the fairer sex was no stranger to the shooting-ranges.

Both archery and riflery have made their claim for recognition as a suitable and entertaining intra-mural sport at Anderson College and stand to become very important in future years. Under the direct supervision of Coach May, as are all participants of intra-mural athletics, the archers and riflemen should gain valuable instruction, for Mr. May is himself an ardent fan of the art of sharpshooting.



Racketeers

Although intercollegiate tennis has been a part of Anderson College's athletic schedule for some time, this year marks the beginning of an active expansion program. Even this year the number of colleges contested with were doubled over previous years. Two main factors are aiding this plan of progress, the first being that it is a part of Mr. May's project to increase and develop all of Anderson College's athletics. The second reason is found in the spontaneous growth of interest in tennis on the part of the students themselves. An explanation for this latter reason may be found in the construction of better playing facilities. The gymnasium has a regulation size court that is available throughout the year in any sort of weather. The out-of-door courts, too, have been improved; a new court has been added making a total of three playing areas; backstops have been constructed around the whole, and each court has been lengthened to provide for better "back-court" playing.

The effect has already been seen in new inspiration in the team and great improvement in their playing. In their first matches which were played as this book goes to press they easily disposed of their opponents. These first victories we feel confident presage for them much future success.
