





School History

THE Anderson Bible Training-School is the result of a strong religious conviction on the part of the older ministers of the church. They saw and felt the great need for more and better equipped young men and women for gospel service. For years before the organization of this school, many hearts were burdened because of the greatness of the work to be done, and the limited number of young ministers, who were able to cope with the difficulties and problems that confront every minister of the gospel. Many young men and women have felt the hand of the Lord upon them for active service, and realizing their great inabilities, have called out to God for a school, wherein they might become better versed in the Bible and other related subjects. Thus the Anderson Bible Training-School came into existence.

This School is located northeast from the business section, and just outside the limits of the city of Anderson. Just east of the school building and joining the campus are the large camp-grounds and buildings, where the Church of God hold their annual June camp-meetings. The neat appearance of the school building and its well kept lawns and shrubberies are a pleasing sight. Students and visitors coming here are immediately impressed with the attractiveness of the school

with its surroundings.

On Oct. 2, 1917, a large company of interested students were present to begin their studies; and everything considered the first year's efforts brought very gratifying results. The attendance for the year 1918-1919 was slightly in excess of the previous year, but in 1919-1920 the total enrolment was 145. Each year has shown a greater interest than the previous one, and all indications show that the interest and attendance are steadily and rapidly on the increase. Students have flocked here from all parts of America, and a number have come from

foreign fields.

The success of this School thus far has been very apparent. A large majority of the students who have been here are out in active service for the Master. A number are telling the story of the cross in foreign lands. The school's success has been attributed to the excellent instruction given, and to the devoted and Spirit-filled lives of the faculty, who are sacrificing the best of their lives for the training of young workers. The church and ministry also have co-operated with their prayers and means, and the God of Heaven has bestowed great and manifold blessings.

THERE assembled in the A. B. T. S. camp, October, 1920, young men and women from various places. They had heard and answered the Great General's urgent call for re-inforcements to assist the troops now in the field, and also to take the places of many who had fallen in battle. Ten states in the Union; four provinces of Canada; Athens, Greece; and Tokio, Japan, are represented in the Class of '22. Though most of us were strangers to one another, it was not long until we became acquainted, and our hearts were melted together by the warm influence of love. With the armor of God on we entered into earnest training under efficient instructions.

After eight months in the treadmill of hard study, mixed with many pleasant experiences, we were granted four months' leave. Some members of the Class served in the trenches, battling against the enemy and his host during the summer. Others did secular work of various kinds to replenish their purses.

The fall of 1921 saw a happy reunion of students. There was a tinge of sadness to it, however, as several of the Class failed to answer the roll call; sickness, lack of money, etc., had hindered some from returning.

We shall not soon forget the patient, kind interest the teachers have taken in us. It is this to a great extent that has made the graduation Class of '22 the largest one in the history of the A. B. T. S. The Class of '22 also has the distinction of publishing the first School Annual. A rather thrilling event in the Class's history was the last basket ball game of the season, played by the Seniors and the Juniors. The Senior line-up consisted of Captain Al. Linthicum, privates Caldwell, Hatch, Egert, Clarke, and Busch. There was heavy cannonading from both sides, but fortunately there were no casualties.

Our trusty gunners succeeded in making a score of thirteen, while the Juniors scored eight.
